Government is taking action to ensure school jurisdictions have predictable and sustainable student transportation

funding.

Each EIPS rider from Grades 1 -12, should have received a \$21.00 credit against their student transportation fees for the

2022-23

school year. While riders in kindergarten should have seen a \$10.50 credit.

NEW CURRICULUM UPDATE

The Board received for information an update on the Division's work to support the rollout of the new

kindergarten to Grade 6 curriculum. The province plans to implement the new curriculum using a phased-

in approach.

- Fall 2022, schools province wide will introduce the new elementary mathematics and English language

arts and literature curriculum (kindergarten to Grade 3), and the new physical education and wellness

curriculum to students in kindergarten to Grade 6.

- Fall 2023, schools provincewide will introduce the new elementary mathematics and English language

arts and literature curriculum (grades 4 to 6); and fine arts, science and French Immersion language

arts and literature (kindergarten to Grade 3).

- Fall 2024, schools provincewide will introduce all remaining elementary subjects. To prepare, the Division has put together a New Curriculum team, made up of seven curriculum and

assessment area-expert teachers—thanks to Board-provided funds to ensure the successful

implementation divisionwide. Already, the group has organized numerous professional learning

opportunities, developed resource materials for staff, assessments, report cards and created the Scope

and Sequences for subjects launching in the fall. Throughout the summer and next year, the team will

continue expanding this work and ensure capacity-building opportunities and a smooth transition for

students.

Care Giver Series:

Alberta Health Services, in collaboration with the Mental Health Foundation, offers free online programming for parents of children

and youth. Sessions will be offered on Zoom. Upcoming topics include strategies for positive mental health, resiliency and

Canada To Launch 988 mental health crises hotline in fall 2023

Canadians who need immediate mental health crises will be able to Canadians text or call 988 and obtain counselling in the

fall of next year, the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) announced. Starting at the

end of November 2023, calls and texts to 988 will be directed to mental health crises or suicide prevention services, free of

charge, once the number is implemented by telephone and wireless service providers, the CRTC said in a statement. The

implementation of 988 as an easy to remember three-digit number will help reduce barriers to mental health and suicide prevention resource.
